Wayfinding issues in dementia – assessment and management Wayfinding loss associated with dementia results in excessive, potentially hazardous walking, wandering and getting lost. Wandering is complex for staff and families to manage and is a source of role stress and burden. This workshop focuses on the clinical presentation of these behaviours and a strategy to help generate responsive, flexible care solutions for use in the workplace.

Its spatial attributes are applicable to the design of other settings where death is supported as a normal part of living. This presentation highlights how spatial practices can assist in the holistic care of the dying.

Creating culturally connected communities at work An increased demand for aged care services in Australia is being met by migrant staff, many from culturally and linguistically diverse (CaLD) backgrounds. But the impact on the care of people with dementia is not understood. This presentation discusses the results of a study into the experiences of CaLD staff caring for people with dementia, how to support their needs and develop a cohesive multicultural workforce in residential dementia care.

This presentation sees the launch of the Nungoo Ngich Dunga Ngich DVD which documents a three-year collaboration between Aboriginal artist Ron Gidgup, a Hall & Prior residential aged care facility, filmmaker Arun Raj and the WA DTSC – using art to create cultural awareness and improve staff capability.
