About this workshop

The impact of dementia on families appears very much different when the dementia occurs a at younger age. For example there is a need for help and support regarding information and care options, financial difficulties, meaningful daytime activities, the management of behavioural changes and the burden of caring for a younger individual while sustaining other roles.

The Florence Centre for Specialized Care in Young-Onset Dementia was founded in 1994. The aim of the Centre is to provide services that meet the needs of younger individuals and their families. In the past years a care program was developed that consists of different services that can be initiated to complement informal care.

Around 2000, Florence together with another Dutch care organisation initiated the *Dutch National Younger Onset Taskforce*. The primary aim of the taskforce was to join forces with other care organisations and develop a *National Young-Onset Dementia Care Program*, which was established in 2004. In 2007 Florence together with the three Alzheimer Centres in the Netherlands initiated the *Needs in Young-Onset Dementia (NeedYD)* study. The *NeedYD* study is a longitudinal multicentre study in which people with young-onset dementia and their caregiver are followed and assessed every six months. The results of the *NeedYD*-study have been used to further improve the services at the Florence Centre and the other members of the *National Young-Onset Dementia Taskforce*.

- Explore international models of Younger-Onset Dementia care
- Develop responsive care for people living with Younger-Onset Dementia
